#### CONSTITUTION

Article I - NAME

The name of this organization is: Cessna 120/140 Association, Inc.

Article II - LOCATION

location and home office to be at a site designated by the Board of Directors.

Article III - PURPOSE

ne purposes for which this Association is formed are:

- A. To encourage, aid and engage in the preservation, improvement, and better understanding Ecessna 120/140 aircraft.
- B. To foster, promote, and engage in aviation education.
- C. To provide a source of information pertaining to maintenance, operation, modifications, and availability of parts of Cessna 120/140 aircraft.
- D. Preservation of the model.
- E. Further enjoyment of Fly-Ins and aviation fellowship.
- F. Provide incentive for restoration of approximately 1,500 Cessna 120/140 aircraft to lying status.
- G. Provide incentive for pride in ownership, assuring a continued increased appreciation value.

Article IV - MEMBERSHIP

ligibility for membership is open to any person of good moral character subject to approval the Board of Directors.

Article V - OFFICERS

- A. The elective officers of the organization shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary-reasurer, and four directors.
- B. The Board of Directors shall consist of the elective officers plus the immediate past resident.

Article VI - AMENDMENTS

ne Constitution may be repealed, amended, or new articles adopted by being submitted by a no-thirds vote of the membership present at an annual meeting. Suggested amendments must submitted in writing 30 days before the annual meeting.

#### BY LAWS

Article I - MEMBERSHIP

ection 1. Classification of Members:

- A. A voting member shall be any member of the Association in good standing.
- B. An honorary member (non-voting) shall be any person nominated by the membership and opproved by the Board of Directors as such.

ection 2. Term of Membership:

- A. A membership shall be terminated for non-payment of dues sixty (60) days after date yable.
- B. Any member deemed undesirable by acts or deeds that tend to jeopardize the Association to be expelled from membership at any annual meeting by a 75% vote of members present.

Article II - ELECTIONS

- A. Officers will be elected by the members present at the regular annual meeting by simple sjority.
- B. Term of office shall be one year except for the four directors who shall serve for two ears and be elected on alternate years.
- C. A nominating committee shall be appointed by the President, consisting of not less than ree (3) members in good standing, no later than six (6) months prior to the annual business seting and shall designate one of their members to act as chairman. Such committee shall shmit their recommendations to be included in the notice of the annual meeting. Every effort all be made to nominate directors to reflect the geographical makeup of the organization.
- D. Nominations may be made from the floor by any member in good standing. A minimum of no nominations for each office shall be submitted.

Article III - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

ion 1. President:

. The President shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Association and of the Board Directors. He may call special meetings of the members of the Board of Directors, and shall

ave, subject to the advice and control of the Directors, general charge of business of the ssociation. He shall execute in the name of the Association all certificates of membership. a shall execute with the Secretary all contracts, instruments and checks which have first seen approved by the Board of Directors.

ection 2. Vice President:

- A. The Vice-President shall be vested with the powers and duties of the President in case f his absence, disability or inability to perform the duties of his office.
- B. The Vice-President shall also perform such duties connected with the operation of the ssociation as he may undertake at the suggestions of the President. ection 3. Secretary-Treasurer:
- A. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors books provided for that purpose. He shall also attend to giving and serving of notices of il meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors. He shall keep a proper membership pok showing the name of each member of the Association; and the book of Bylaws and such other poks and papers as the Board of Directors may order. He shall execute in the name of the sociation, all contracts, instruments and all checks for the expenditures authorized by the pard of Directors. He shall receive and deposit all funds of the Association in a bank elected by the Board of Directors. Funds shall be paid out only by check as hereinbefore covided. He shall also account for all receipts, disbursements and balance on hand.
- B. The Secretary-Treasurer may be bonded at the discretion of the Board of Directors. ection 4. Board of Directors:
- A. The powers, business and property of the Association shall be exercised, conducted and entrolled by the Board of Directors subject to report and control of membership at the annual seting.

Article IV - VACANCY

vacancy on the Board of Directors may be filled by appointment by the remaining members of ne Board by a simple majority of those remaining.

- B. A quorum shall consist of ten (10) voting members.

  - 10. Election of officers.
  - Remarks for the good of the association.

Article VII - PUBLICATIONS

e Association shall have an official news letter and an editor shall be appointed by the ard of Directors to supervise its publication. Funds for this publication shall be provided on the treasury.
